As Dan Phillips reported in the January Coastline, work is proceeding in the Sunday School Building with the new roof being completed, a volunteer interior painting team taking shape under the leadership of Tom Cullison, ADA compliant restrooms nearing completion, water fountain installed, HVAC and carpeting work scheduled and fire alarm and smoke detectors installed soon. Dan, we miss you and hope your recovery from hip surgery goes smoothly!

One Design/Build company has presented tentative plans for the new sanctuary/social hall building, with a two others making their presentations on January 28<sup>th</sup> . Last Sunday, January 26<sup>th</sup> , we held a Coffee with the Board and New Building Team after the service. Guerry Willis presented an update on the the Sunday School building renovations (complete with photos) while Joe Naset gave a timeline of items to be completed in order to remove and replace the sanctuary/social hall building, including permits from the Town of Morehead City.

The Team is hoping to have plans reviewed by the end of February, then presented to our Board of Trustees, then to the congregation near the end of March. As a newer member of the team, I have been very impressed by, and grateful for, the knowledge and dedication that the team members have brought to the process as well as the hands-on work they have provided. They won't toot their own horns, so I will tell you that countless hours have been spent by team members getting bids from contractors, ordering and installing 'parts' when possible, meeting with Town staff, overseeing contract work, finding design/ build companies, etc. If you are able to help, your contribution to the painting team will be greatly appreciated.

Two dates are scheduled thus far: Wednesday, Jan. 29 and Friday, Jan 31.

We are sad to see Casey Benavides leaving the team due to other commitments and her family's upcoming move to Peru. Casey, we appreciate your participation and wish you and your family all the best as you prepare to make this transition.

#### **February 9: UU Biography 1850-1900: Quillen Shinn.** Quillen Hamilton Shinn has been called "the greatest Universalist



domestic missionary in the post-Civil War period." Between 1870 and 1907, he is credited with founding at least 40 churches, recruiting 1000 new members and thirty new ministers to Universalism. Named Universalism's "Missionary to the Southern States," he loved the Carolinas and Virginia – but in his lifetime, he visited every state in the Union and most Canadian provinces, preaching the love of God, the immortality of the soul, the certainty of punishment for sin, and the universality of salvation. this morning, let's get to know this Universalist forbear.

### February 16: "The Middle Path"



It was during his time in Bodh Gaya, India that Buddha realized the only way to Enlightenment was the Middle Way of moderation, between the extremes of sensual indulgence and self-mortification.

# **Children's Religious Education Worship Programs**



Our Children's Religious Education Program for February finds the Jr./Sr. High Youth group enrolled in our congregation's lifespan faith development program called *Families*. The program looks at families through the lens of our UU Principles and aims to broaden and deepen respect, appreciation, and care for different kinds of families. The heart of this program is the photo-documentary project that places youth in a leadership role, listening, learning, and representing the lives of families in their congregation. Autonomy, creativity, and sensitivity are nurtured in the process. The end product is a visual, artistic representation of a diversity of families from the congregation in June. We will be seeking diverse families in the fellowship to participate in this project with our youth.

The six to nine-year-olds will be participating in the lifespan faith development program Moral Tales. Every day our children go forth into a complex world where they are often faced with difficult decisions and situations. Moral Tales attempts to provide children with the spiritual and ethical tools they will need to make choices and take actions reflective of their Unitarian Universalist beliefs and values.

Our program is still seeking someone to be a leader for the three to five-year-old group. They will be participating in the lifespan faith development program *We Are Many We Are One*. Every week of the lifespan faith development curriculum is planned out and the children will learn about their religious community and tradition, as well as the freedom to discover and express their uniqueness. The primary goal of this curriculum is to create an atmosphere that invites religious growth and learning.
