March Reflections from Sally





We are getting there!



New Building Team.

Update from the New Building Team:

First and foremost, **SAVE THE DATE for an** Open House at the Annex at 2900 Bridges Street, on Sunday, March, 29th from 11:45 to 1 p.m. This is your opportunity to tour the building and enjoy some coffee hour refreshments at the same time. A hearty thank you to Tom Cullison and all of the volunteers who helped to paint the interior of the building – it looks nice and bright and clean in there! Since then, the carpet has been installed, the HVAC is up and running, partitions are ordered for the restrooms, the rooms have been keyed, a lockbox has been ordered that will allow emergency personnel access to the building if necessary, and an automatic door opener is to be installed soon. While we still have a few loose ends to tie up before that date, we are confident that the jobs that remain will be completed in plenty of time for us to host the Open House on March 29th..

We continue to meet with three design/build companies to fine tune their plans to our needs.




In addition to designing the new sanctuary/ social hall building, they are including land-scaping required by the Town of Morehead City, space needed for parking, a playground area and a memorial garden. All three companies have had several meetings with the New Building Team in person or in video conference. At some meetings we have had to shuffle a set of plans off the table while another company walks in the door with their own plans in hand - this work is exciting in more ways than one! We hope to be making a decision in the near future.

Meanwhile, back at the 1300 Evans Street Ranch, the Green Sanctuary Committee is discussing our use of paper products, and a Facilities Committee is taking shape to ensure that our new buildings and grounds are well maintained and cared for. Thank you to all who volunteer!

Children's Religious Education Worship Programs and Activities

Religious Education and Worship Round Table Discussion: On Friday, March

13th from 6:30-8:00 in the Social Hall we will hold our last Round Table Discussion for the fellowship to give input on how we, as a congregation, build and grow our religious education program for the children and youth of our fellowship.

How do we help our children and youth be the leaders of tomorrow in our church, community, and the world around us? What do we dream of and what needs to occur to make this happen? This discussion is open to all members, friends, children and youth of the fellowship. Please come share your thoughts and ideas and what your vision is of this program moving forward. Childcare and snacks will be available.





Children's Religious Education and Worship Program for March finds the Jr. High Youth group enrolled in our congregation's lifespan faith development program called *Families*. The workshops look at families through the lens of our UU Principles and aims to broaden and deepen respect, appreciation, and care for different kinds of families. The heart of this program is the photo-documentary project that places youth in a leadership role, listening, learning, and representing the lives of families in their congregation. Karen Baggott came into our workshop in February and taught Abby and Ella how to take pictures with a different point of view. Their Families Luncheons are planned for March 1 and the 22nd. They will be photographing and interviewing their families during this time and the families will be doing a write-back to the youth about the photographs they have taken.

The six to nine-year-olds are participating in the lifespan faith development program *Moral Tales*. Every day our children go forth into a complex world where they are often faced with

difficult decisions and situations. Moral Tales attempts to provide children with the spiritual and ethical tools they will need to make choices and take actions reflective of their Unitarian Universalist beliefs and values.

It takes a village to raise a child, it takes a congregation to raise the children and youth of our Fellowship.

SOCIAL ACTION

March 5th Sunday Collection: Carteret County Public Schools Foundation Grandparent Fund

Whenever there is a 5th Sunday, it is UCF's practice to give all non-pledge donations in the collection plate to a charity selected by the Social Action Committee. Over the last couple of years, the Social Action Committee, led by Mary Anna Newman, a former Social Worker, has been exploring ways in which we can help children in the foster care system.

We organized Adult RE programs with speakers talking about the foster care system as well as a speaker on the Guardian ad litem program. Mary Anna talked with the Department of Social Services as well as the social workers in the Carteret County schools, asking what

needs were unmet for these children. What she found was that both DSS and the school counselors said that the children in foster care and their foster parents were usually having their financial needs met by the foster care program. However, the school counselors told her that there were numerous low-income grandparents who were taking care of their



grandchildren because the parents couldn't for various reasons. These grandparents often struggle to make ends meet and do not have extra money to pay for things like tutoring, summer camps, band instruments, etc. The counselors suggested that we might be able to set up a fund within the Carteret County Public School Foundation that would be designated to meet those needs. We contacted Tabbie Nance who administers the Foundation, and she said she would be happy to create that fund if we raised money for it. The Social Action Committee at our November meeting decided to make this Grandparents Fund the recipient of our March 29th 5th Sunday collection.

Please give generously on March 29th to help these children and their grandparents. If you are not going to be at church that day, you can give your money ahead of time to Amy Jones or Mary Anna Newman. If you write a check, make it out to UCF with 5th Sunday in the memo line.
