April News from your New Building Team



March was a busy month! Think about a small bowl of spaghetti; now find and tie the loose end of one to another and another. WoW! Don't get lost in the rich sauce, the aesthetics of our new space is wonderful. The temporary occupancy permit has been issued by Morehead City and moving our new furniture into the sanctuary has begun. The FFC will also be moving the familiar furniture and wall hangings from 1300 Evans to their new home. The piano will be moved in and tuned to help our neglected voices sing, sing, sing.

The electric vehicle charging station is the most visible item to show that we care about earth's climate and environment. A closer look will show the parking lot has about 50 percent porous surface due to the Ecoraster. The building was constructed to be environmentally friendly, from the energy efficient HVAC, and the thick insulation to the energy saving LED lighting and the ceiling fans to keep the air mixing comfortably. The building was built to withstand hurricanes up to 150 mph wind for the roof and our windows will

protect from high speed debris that may be blowing around during a storm.

The last visible construction will be completed under the watchful eye of Tom Wentworth, et al, of the landscaping committee. Yard Barber is the selected contractor for our project. Morehead City has specific guidelines for landscaping that include set back from curbs and sidewalks, number of plants, type of plants, mix of shrubs, small trees and large trees. And more. Under the leadership of a great committee, we have

weeded out those invasive plants that Morehead City allows, (shame on them?) and our campus will have only native plants to fill the required guidelines. The jewel in the crown (or tree in the circle) will be the Live Oak, donated by Pam Holliday.

Some of you have noticed the brick sign along the sidewalk on Bridges Street. Well, we kept this relic since if it is removed, we cannot put a new sign along Bridges St. Upon looking at the big picture, we have now decided we really don't want that old red brick monstrosity in our front yard. Therefore, it will be covered in stucco for better curb appeal. Maybe it is already stucco? We are moving into a wonderful space with both in-person Sunday services and continuing Zoom services for those who choose to do so. We have created a place to meet, a place for learning, fellowship and fun.

Now is the time to LEARN how to operate the new systems and equipment in the church. Get involved in music, operating music and video equipment; operate kitchen equipment from coffee maker to dishwasher. (Yes, there really is only one correct way to load a machine.) We can always use new ideas in the Finance Committee and Worship Committee. In addition, the newest challenge will be operating the two buildings on our campus, who will help make sure the lights are turned off, that the restrooms are clean, that the doors are locked?

April – could this be the last month for a newsletter? Only the Shadow knows...

Vice President's Column

I'm filling in for Board President Melva Kearney again this month with another newsletter article from the Vice President. Melva is continuing her recovery and rehabilitation after shoulder surgery.

I drive down Bridges Street every time I go to Morehead City from Beaufort now so I can drive by 2900 Bridges Street. I imagine what it will be like to worship, to attend Board and committee meetings and religious education classes in the new building. In my mind, I can see working in the big new kitchen and having a pot luck dinner someday. But if there's anything I've learned in the past two years of this pandemic, it is that I have to be patient, to be careful, and to be cautious, because I am concerned about others and everything takes longer in these pandemic days.

As Unitarian Universalists, we affirm that all people are valuable, and that we are a part of an interdependent web of existence. Your UCF Board, Leadership Council, and New Building Team have developed a COVID policy that will hopefully serve to respect UU values while we protect those who attend activities at 2900 Bridges Street. The recommendations of health officials and the policies of other congregations were reviewed. The recognition that many in our congregation are at high risk for infection as well as considerations that our new building will require continued work by contractors even after we start using the building also guided the policy. The Board will review the policy and update it as needed at least every 2 months.

The policy may be read on the congregation's web page, www.ucfnc.org. Please look for it using the Search feature. It is likely to be more restrictive than local businesses but perhaps less restrictive than a healthcare facility.

We will ask that those who attend meetings and worship be vaccinated if there is a vaccine for their age group (but showing a card won't be required) and wear a mask if over 2 years of age. There will be masks if someone forgets to bring one. If the risk level (according to CovidActNow.org) increases to HIGH (orange), we will have virtual worship and recommend virtual meetings. A virtual option for worship and meetings will be offered at all risk levels for those who want to attend virtually. The policy isn't perfect, but I think it is one with which we can work while upholding our values of the inherent worth of all by making our buildings as safe as possible.

Taking longer to do most anything has been a frustrating part of pandemic life. It has certainly taken longer to build the church because of supply chain issues and shortages of building materials. The process of the transition in the interim ministry to be ready for a ministerial search has also been slower. I was relieved to find out that other congregations who are in interims between settled ministers are delaying their searches for new ministers and are extending the typical 2-year process. In conversations with the Board, the Leadership Council, the Transition Team, and with congregants at a Coffee with the Board on March 6, I heard that many of you agreed that this congregation should extend our interim. I look forward to more discussions of how that will work for us, but for now, it's good to know that there is more time to get settled in 2900 Bridges, to learn what our expenses will be, to look at our budget, and to define our needs and desires for the next steps in professional ministry at UCF.

Saturday, April 2-9 AM

I am hoping that we will have more students join us as it is on a weekend and not on a school day. We will be doing all of the background painting and doing a big sail boat on a separate wall. Vinyl stickers of ocean fish and mammals, seaweed and other fishy things will be stuck to the wall so our younger little ones can participate as well. It should be a fun morning. I hope to see you there.
