Happy Pride Month!

It's difficult to believe that so many months have passed since my first letter to you, which I wrote surrounded by boxes in Ohio. Now I am writing from my office in the soon-to-be Rev. Sally B. White Center. And: I have some exciting news for you (which I am also a bit nervous about):

OUR VISION STATEMENT

Our congregation's vision is to be a visible presence in the community, growing a just world through spiritual enrichment, compassionate action, and free religious inquiry.

A WELCOMING CONGREGATION

We are an intentionally diverse community, welcoming of and enriched by people of varying cultures, economic and ethnic backgrounds; by people of varying sexual orientations, gender identities and family compositions; by people of all races, ages and beliefs. I have started my gender transition.

This is something that has been a long time coming, although I didn't expect to start here and now. But, after a few months at the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship, it became clear to me that this was a healthy, supportive congregation, and that I could hardly do better. There's no guarantee that the next place I go to won't be toxic or dysfunctional! And so, I decided I had better seize the moment.

To answer some commonly asked questions: I started testosterone in March, and so far I feel great. No, I have not chosen a name yet. Yes, my pronouns will change at some point. The best way that you—UCF, as well as the individual reading this—can support me is by continuing to be your excellent selves, coming together to be the best congregation that you can be. The timeline for my transition is a little unknown, because it depends on how quickly or slowly I feel comfortable going. We're all figuring this out as we go along.

Perhaps you have more questions that I haven't answered. Perhaps you are not comfortable asking me your questions directly. That makes sense! If that is the case, the current Committee on Ministry has agreed to be question-takers. You may take your questions about me to: John Brobst; Leigh Harrison; Louise Hughes; Martha Kenworthy; or Terri Thomas. Their contact information is in Breeze. (And if you have not set up your Breeze account, now is a good time to do so! There is a very convenient phone app.)

I am taking all of July off (so there will be no July letter from me in Our Coastline) for rest and recuperation—and also to spend some time getting reacquainted with myself and make some decisions regarding name, pronouns, personal style, appearance, so on and so forth. So, when I come back, I will probably look and sound a little different. But I will still be the same person, I will still be your interim minister, and I will still be invested in the present and the future of UCF.

I'm so excited about this next year. I see a lot of possibilities for us. I can't wait to get started!

President's Column

Happy June My Friends:

The end of my 2-year term as Board President is fast approaching. As a bookend to my columns, I offer here an inspirational snapshot of the past 2 years. Despite the lack of a physical meeting space during that time and the inherent limitations of Zoom, just take a look at what we have accomplished. Keep in mind that, every time I use the word we, you, your, our or us here, I am referring not to myself or the Board as an entity apart from the congregation. I am referring to **YOU**—the entire congregation of the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship. Let's look back on what we have done together.

In July 2020, we hired a realtor to sell the Evans Street building. At the time, we knew the amount we information and options are also made available to needed from the sale was significantly higher than the appraisal price. We also considered whether selling the building too early would leave us homeless until the new sanctuary was built. We had no idea how long the pandemic would actually relegate us to Zoom. Yet, we still leaned in as though we had nothing to fear. The result—we sold the building for cash within 2 weeks of listing it for a whopping \$72,000 over the appraisal price. Plus, we solicited a \$5000 additional donation from the buyer and a return of one-half percent on the realtor's fee, also a donation.

In August 2020, we began a strategic planning effort in anticipation of having a completed new campus. The purpose was to give voice to **our** dreams for UCF's future and be able to make concrete plans to fulfill those dreams. At the same time, in anticipation of the Evans Street closing date, packing and moving crews, with the needed vehicles and boxes to empty the building, created a synchronized

schedule to keep everyone COVID-safe. We were nothing less than a well-oiled UCF machine.

In September 2020, we selected the design for our new sanctuary building and we signed a construction contract with Smithson Builders. That month, we also began sending volunteers to SUULE—leadership training sponsored by the UU Southern District. Because there was a huge discount on virtual attendance, we were able to send more than 15 of you to train for leadership.

In October 2020, we began renovating our Facebook page and the UCF website, the result presenting a more comprehensive and updated image to the larger community. At the same time, lots of useful our congregation.

In November 2020, we saw the real possibility of taking on too much debt to manage as a result of our building project. We put our heads together with an eye towards a solution, rather than calling a halt to our dreams. We were able to avert that crisis by forming the Building Bridges Taskforce. Within just a few days, scads of us joined together making contribution packets and scheduling meetings to assist our fellow congregants to plan their contributions. It made all the difference for our future and **we** have every reason to feel proud of the difference we made. Because of the Building Bridges Taskforce making that push, our outstanding debt is under \$180,000 on a campus valued at almost \$1,000,000. We still have to repay the Endowment Fund and a Construction Loan; but we will persevere.

In January 2021, we purchased the Breeze Management System. We can now go to a single online place to contact each other; synchronize UCF's scheduled events; and more.

In <u>February 2021</u>, **we** called the Interim Minister Search Team to find a highly-qualified person to serve **our** transition toward a new settled minister. The Team's task was to compose a packet containing **our** history, **our** current needs, and **our** dreams for the future of the congregation. This packet had to do more than introduce **us**. It had to present an inviting picture of UCF where applicants could envision themselves serving **our** congregation.

In <u>March and April 2021</u>, **we** prepared for and conducted Constructive Conversations with the Congregation. **We** signed up for focus groups and enthusiastically offered **our** answers to prepared questions. Attendance was so good that, in almost every case, two sessions for each subject had to be conducted to include everyone. This was a very valuable effort because, without knowing **our** wishes for UCF's future, good planning is impossible.

In <u>May 2021</u>, the Interim Minister Search Team went back to work to interview the multiple candidates who showed interest in **our** position. After those interviews, the Team had to rank the candidates and the candidates had to rank the congregations. In UCF's case, the candidate **we** gave the highest ranking also gave **us** the highest ranking. Happily, this is how **we** were able to hire Rev. Michelle Ma.

In <u>June 2021</u>, **we** had a Groundbreaking Ceremony for the Sanctuary building at **our** new campus.

In <u>September 2021</u>, **our** Interim Minister—Rev. Michelle Ma—started her tenure. In <u>October 2021</u>, Rev. Michelle began forming the Transition Team, designed to represent **our** interests as **we** prepare to search for a settled minister. It wasn't too long before the Transition Team and the Furnishings and Finishings Team began coordinating **our** transition into **our** 2 buildings on Bridges Street. They are still doing this.

Between <u>November 2021 and April 2022</u>, **we** saw to a million small, medium, and large details regarding the new campus. One of those details was the installation of the Electric Car Charging Station. This Station is only one representation of **our** congregation's commitment to harmony with the Earth.

In <u>April 2022</u>, **we** received **our** Certificate of Occupancy for **our** new sanctuary building. Let's say it together—**WOOOOOOO HOOOOO!!**

On <u>May 8, 2022</u>, we held our first in-person service in our new sanctuary building. We had been meeting on Zoom for just short of 2 years.

So, here **we** are in <u>June 2022</u>. I hope **you** have found inspiration in what **we** have accomplished over the past 2 years. At the same time, know that this list represents only the tip of the iceberg. The UCF community is always focused on service to each other, to the Fellowship, and to the larger community.

Excellent work!

Thank **you all** so much for **your** support in my role as Board President. It has been my pleasure to serve **us all.**

THE ORIGIN OF PRIDE MONTH

LGBTQ+ Pride Month is celebrated each year during the month of June to acknowledge and honor the Stonewall Uprising in New York. (As noted by the STONEWALL Veterans' Association, the reference to these events as the Stonewall Riots was initially used by police to justify their use of force.) Police raids of LGBTQ+ establishments occurred frequently but when they raided the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in Greenwich Village, on June 28, 1969, members of the LGBTQ+ community fought back against the years of abuse, discrimination and anti-LGBTQ+ laws.

While the Stonewall Uprising did not initiate the gay rights movement, it is widely considered to have galvanized the LGBTQ+ community and launched a new era in the fight for LGBTQ+ rights in the United States. The name "Pride" was given to the month to encourage the feeling of pride as the LGBTQ+ community and allies gather to celebrate and support LGBTQ+ rights. Pride events attract millions of participants to honor the Stonewall Uprising and to recognize the impact that LGBTQ+ individuals have locally, nationally and internationally. Pride also acknowledges the members of the community who have been lost to HIV/AIDS and hate crimes and draws attention to the issues and discrimination the LGBTQ+ community still faces today.

In acknowledgement of the significance that the Stonewall Uprising had on the LGBTQ+ rights movement, the Stonewall Inn was declared a historic landmark by the city of New York in 2015 and in 2016, President Barack Obama named it a national monument.

A Personal Experience with UCF, a Welcoming Congregation Observance for Pulse Night Club Attack Submitted by Amy Jones, Member, Welcoming Congregation Committee

Leigh and I moved to Beaufort as fulltime residents in the Spring of 2015. Over the next year, we visited UCF several times but did not make a commitment to become members. On June 12, 2016, one of our biggest fears happened when a gunman entered Pulse, a gay nightclub in Orlando, and opened fire killing 49 people and injuring 53 more people. This terrorist attack is the deadliest incidence of violence against the LGBTQ+ community in the United States.

Leigh and I have been together since 1984 and in our "younger" years, we would frequent the only LGBTQ+ nightclub in Greenville. It was here that we met and celebrated with many dear friends who we consider our family and community. We often wondered, given the magnitude of intolerance towards the LGBTQ+ community especially during this time period, if the sanctuary of love and acceptance we had at this nightclub would be shattered by an act of violence. Thankfully that did not happen, however, seeing the incomprehensible occur at Pulse brought back the harsh reality that there are still people who are fearful and intolerant of the LGBTQ+ community.

Two weeks after the terrorist attack on the LGBTQ+ community at Pulse, Leigh and I attended the service held at UCF to honor the Pulse nightclub victims. To our knowledge, the service at UCF was the only acknowledgment in Carteret County of the horrific attack at Pulse. Through this public acknowledgement, the local community could clearly see UCF as a welcoming, supportive and loving refuge for all. On our ride back to Beaufort and into the evening, Leigh and I talked about how

during this time of remembrance and mourning for the victims of Pulse and the LGBTQ community at-large, we felt a kind, welcoming and loving presence at UCF that day. We knew that we had found our sanctuary in the people of this congregation.

In our nearly 38 years together and living in rural eastern NC, Leigh and I have experienced a wide spectrum of responses to our relationship. We have experienced hostility and intolerance but thankfully this has not happened often. We have experienced tolerance. Tolerance, as defined by the Oxford dictionary, is "the ability or willingness to tolerate the existence of opinions or behaviors that one dislikes or disagrees with." We have experienced acceptance as well. Acceptance goes a step beyond tolerance. You can tolerate something without accepting it but you cannot accept something without tolerating it.

In this church, Leigh and I are not merely tolerated. We feel accepted and celebrated for who we are and the beautiful thing is that this is not unique to us. We have experienced and witnessed the "Welcoming Congregation" statement in action. The people of UCF live the UU principle that affirms and promotes the inherent worth and dignity of every person. Do we all still have room to learn and grow? Absolutely and we will rely on and draw strength from the power of love and acceptance to guide our way.

We are thankful for our UCF family.

Taking Care of our Buildings – Everyone Can Help!

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ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship will be conducted in person as well as on Zoom on Sunday, June 12, 2022 immediately after our Worship Service.

There will be a notice and ballot form sent to all members and friends on May 29, 2022, two weeks prior to the meeting, which will include the final agenda and the proposed budget.

The required business of the Annual Meeting includes reports on Fellowship activities from the Board and Committees, the budget for 2022-23, election of Officer Trustees and Nominating Committee members as indicated, and any other business. Officers and Nominating Committee members are elected on a staggered basis to provide continuity.

There will also be a Bylaw change, which will require us to have a quorum of 50% of the membership to vote. Since, as in prior years, we are meeting in person as well as by Zoom, and votes may be returned by email, snail mail or in person, we are encouraging all in the Fellowship (friends and members) to submit their ballots to the Board Secretary, Jo Ellen Essex at <u>ucfwelcomenc@gmail.com</u> soon after receiving the notice and ballot form.
