Dear Beloveds,

In the next few months, we are going to talk a lot about going into Search.

A few of us may remember going into Search here at the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship years ago; the Search that eventually brought Rev. Sally B. White to this congregation. A few may also have been in Search at other congregations. Many more may have no idea what to expect, especially those who are new to this congregation and to this faith.

In Unitarian Universalism, each congregation makes its own decision about who to call as their minister, whether that minister is full time or part time, how much that minister is paid, so on and so forth. The Unitarian Universalist Association provides the infrastructure for that Search: they have staff available to answer questions, provide recommended pay scales, and host a "Jobs Board" where congregations and ministers post their records. It is the

responsibility of the congregation to put together a Search Committee, write a Congregational Record (a lengthy profile of the congregation), and have an idea of what the congregation is looking for in a new minister.

Search season generally runs from January through May. In January, ministers begin looking at congregational records, and Search Committees begin receiving applications from ministers. From January through March, the Search Committee interviews applicants (and will fly a couple of them out to meet with in person). In April or May, if a Candidate is found, there is then a **Candidating Week**: a full week of committee meetings and meet-and-greets with the Candidate, culminating in a congregational vote to determine whether or not to call this Candidate as Settled Minister.

There are other ways of acquiring a minister—hiring one on contract, for instance. In that instance, the contract can be renewed if both parties are satisfied; if one or both parties are dissatisfied, then the contract is not renewed and the search for a new contract minister begins. Less romantic than the full vote-and-call process, perhaps, and in some cases more practical—hiring a contract minister is a less expensive process than hosting a Candidating Week. And there are other, in-between options, such as doing a contract-to-call...

UCF's financial capacity, the type of minister UCF needs and wants, when to call that minister...these are all decisions UCF leadership is grappling with right now. And that means UCF leadership needs to hear from **you**! We know that you have high faith and trust in UCF's leadership, and one of our principles is promoting the democratic process. That means everyone has a voice, and that decisions here are made collectively, not just by an elite few.

In the coming months, you should expect to see some Coffee With the Boards, listening circles, perhaps even an old-fashioned survey...all with the goal of learning what **you** think is important and what direction the congregation should go in.

You built this church. Now let's bring it to life.

President's Column

What's next for Unitarian Coastal Fellowship?

Every week, Rev. Micah announces that they are the Interim Minister at Unitarian Coastal Fellowship and that means that there is a time coming when the Interim Ministry will end. What does the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship need to do to be ready to take the next steps? The great economist George Stigler said that "A transition period is a period between two transition periods." That certainly seems to apply to UCF right now!

By the end of December, 2022, decisions will need to be made about what we will do next. Some work is being done now by the UCF Board, the UCF Transition Team, and Rev. Ma that will provide some help in making those decisions.

The UCF Treasurer, David Hughes, and the Finance Committee are working with Ruth Lillian, a volunteer Compensation Consultant with the Unitarian Universalist Association Office of Church Staff Finance, to look at UCF's financial health, and especially our ability to compensate staff, and to plan our future budgets. The Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) will be releasing new compensation guidelines for ministers and staff this fall. The analysis will help UCF decide the compensation level we can best afford, and whether UCF can afford full-time ministry or if part-time ministry is better suited to our financial ability.

At least 20 Unitarian Universalist congregations who were in search for ministers this year did not find ministers. I'm sure that there are many reasons this happened, but what can UCF do to be sure that we are able to attract the minister we want in 2022-2023 or in 2023-2024 whether that is an interim, a contract minister, or a settled minister? Ministers looking for positions shop for congregations who know who they are, who they want to be, and who have a good financial status. UCF will prepare a congregational record for potential ministerial candidates to review. It will contain information about our congregation; our vision and goals; our financial health; proposed and historical budgets, debts, and compensation. Potential candidates will also want to know about the community including our beautiful environment, schools, community activities and resources.

Some questions that need to be answered are: What does UCF do well? What does this congregation want to do better? What do we like about UCF? What needs to change? Can we meet our dreams financially? What kind of ministry does UCF need now? Please join the conversations over the next weeks and months as UCF examines its mission and vision and its abilities to make the mission and vision come to life in its future ministry with the help of our Transition Team and our Interim, Rev. Micah Ma.

UCF Board of Trustees Profiles—Tom Wentworth, Vice President

Tom Wentworth retired from NC State University in the fall of 2018, becoming Professor Emeritus in the Department of Plant and Microbial Biology, where he taught for over forty-two years. He holds a BA degree in biology from Dartmouth College and a PhD degree in plant ecology from Cornell University. Tom has shared his knowledge of the flora and vegetation of the southeast with thousands of students through field trips for his ecology courses at NC State and for field courses offered through the Highlands Biological Station. With Dr. Stephanie



Jeffries, he is co-author of *Exploring Southern Appalachian Forests: An Ecological Guide to 30 Great Hikes in the Carolinas, Georgia, Tennessee, and Virginia* (University of North Carolina Press, 2014). Tom has served in many professional service capacities, and he recently collaborated with a diverse group of plant scientists to create the *Plant Science Decadal Vision 2020-2030*, with the goal of "Reimagining Plants for a Sustainable Future."

Tom and his wife, Linda Rudd, are longtime Unitarian Universalists. Both retain their memberships in the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Raleigh (UUFR), where they first met in the UUFR Choir. Rev. Morris Hudgins, former minister of UUFR, married them on Halloween in 1992, so they have a big wedding anniversary coming up! When Tom retired in 2018, he and Linda began spending much of their time in Beaufort in the cottage they had purchased a couple of years earlier. As Crystal Coast residents, they became increasingly engaged in the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship, where they enjoyed the friendly and caring community as well as Rev. Sally White's sermons. In the fall of 2019, they joined UCF, signing the membership book just as COVID-19 descended on the planet. Since joining UCF, Tom has been an active member of Green Sanctuary, leading frequent nature hikes for



the UCF members and friends. Tom also serves on the Worship and Staffing Committees; he has been involved in decisions about landscaping on the Bridges Street UCF campus, and he is a member of the Common Grounds Task Force. As Vice President, Tom looks forward to becoming more involved in the governance of UCF, helping to guide UCF as it transitions to a new home and a more prominent role in the community.

A Message from the Treasurer

Now that we are settled into our new campus, let's see where we stand financially. The table below lists the sources and amounts of revenue raised for the renovation of the Sally B. White Center and all costs associated with the building of our new sanctuary. Through the incredible generosity of the members and friends of this congregation, we have raised \$835,379.09 (including the endowment).

We took a draw from our Construction Line of Credit (LOC) of \$25,000.00 on 8/22/22 to cover a temporary shortfall and paid back \$12,000.00 on 8/30/22. We are expecting a sales tax refund of \$5600. That refund along with the balance of \$3616.38 in the building fund gives us a total of \$9216.38 in available building funds. There will be one remaining bill for A/V equipment and installation of approximately \$4500 and \$560 for the UV air purifier. The remaining funds (approx. \$4156) will be used to pay down the remaining balance of the LOC (\$13,062.49). So, when all is said and done, we will owe the bank \$8906.49. We would like to be able to pay off the LOC before December 31st when the balance must be converted to a business loan at a higher interest rate. Assistance in the form of loans or donations will be appreciated. We will also have to repay the Endowment Fund \$125,299.83.

Update on the 8th Principle from the Racial Justice Group

"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

The Unitarian Coastal Fellowship is moving towards voting on adoption of the above UU 8th Principle at our Annual Meeting in June of 2023.The Racial Justice Group met on Aug 18 and decided on a timeline for our actions in the next year. This group is open to suggestions from the entire congregation, and anyone is welcome to attend our next meeting which will be in person at the church on October 27 at 4PM. This will be a conversation about race vs. culture and what it means to be "white" plus a check-in on the Get Out the Vote work we will be doing prior to the November 8th election.

Twenty people have signed up for the six sessions of the "Trans Inclusion in Congregations" class currently offered on Wednesday evenings until October 12. This class includes much more than just looking at gender and focuses on creating a "Beloved Community" in our congregation.

The adoption of the 8th Principle will be discussed at the annual retreat for the UCF BoT and Leadership Council in late September. Both governing bodies have already approved moving forward with anti-racism education and advocacy in the following year. Starting in January there will be a regular column in the Coastline about what it means to make the 8th principle an integral part of the fabric of our congregation.

The books we have read during the Anti-Racism Reading Group (ARRG) will be available in the UCF Library for all to read at your leisure. Sally Davis has compiled a list of the most highly recommended books that ARRG has read and published that list in last month's Coastline and <u>HERE</u> on the UCF website. The next ARRG meeting will be on November 17. All are welcome to participate in our discussion of <u>The Fire This</u> <u>Time</u>. Sally Davis can provide you with more information.

In February, which is "Black History Month", we will show three videos over three weeks in the Fellowship Hall which will be open to the public. At the last video there will be a panel discussion about Racial Justice and how it fits into our church, our local community, and our world. If you would like to help in planning these video events, please contact Susan Roberts or Penny Hooper. We will also help with the MLK Celebration at the Civic Center again in 2023 as we have been doing for more than 20 years. Look for opportunities to "stretch" yourself with this topic, as we post them on the bulletin board and as Barb Thomas sends out the weekly bulletin from the UU Justice Ministry of NC.

UCF Fall Nature Walk – Tideland National Recreation Trail



UCF's Green Sanctuary and Adult RE Committees are pleased to announce a second fall nature walk, led by botanist and UCF member Tom Wentworth on Saturday, October 15, 2022. We'll hike the Tideland National Recreation Trail from the Cedar Point Campground in the Croatan National Forest. This is about a 45-minute drive from either Jacksonville or the MHC/Beaufort area, but guite close to Cedar Point, Swansboro, Cape Carteret, and Emerald Isle. The hike will begin at 1:30 PM and take about 2 hours, depending on how often we stop. The easy 1.4 mi loop trail traverses salt marshes (on elevated boardwalks) and forested areas, skirting the edge of the White Oak River Estuary. Please wear comfortable closed-toe shoes, and otherwise dress for the weather. Recommended comfort items include a water bottle, light snack, sunscreen, insect repellent, hat, and sunglasses. If you enjoy birdwatching and photography, don't forget to bring your binoculars and camera. A light daypack is recommended for carrying all your "stuff." This trip is limited to 15 people, and you must pre-register for the trip, first come, first served. October 5th Sunday Collection: Holiday Giving

At UCF, whenever there is a month with five Sundays, we collect donations for a charity during that month and all plate contributions on the 5th Sunday that are not designated as pledge money go to that cause as well. October is a month with five Sundays and the special collection this month will be for our Holiday Giving projects.

For many years now, Unitarian Coastal Fellowship has given generously at holiday time to those in our community who are often left out at this season. During the last two Holiday seasons, we have been very limited in how we can interact with these groups due to COVID, but we still were able to give everyone the gifts. This year we hope to resume more in person contact with the groups mentioned below.

There are three holiday traditions that we have established:

- We put together Holiday Gift Bags containing gift cards (\$20 or \$25) and items hand-made by the Twisted Sisters needlecraft group and give them to those at Hope Mission's Homeless Shelter and Recovery Homes and to clients of Beach House, a program for adults with severe and persistent mental illness
- We also adopt children from the Angel Tree through Project Christmas Cheer. These are children whose parents can't afford to give them much for the holidays. Those selected are vetted by Carteret County Social Services. Our children and youth shop for these Angel children, wrap the presents and have a pizza party.
- We also bring gift bags with handmade hats, scarves, etc to the clients of Empower (formerly Station Club) – our neighbors on Church Street. Empower is a program that provides vocational training for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Before the pandemic, we held an annual Caroling Party for the Station Club but we haven't been able to do that for the last two years. Hopefully we will be able to reinstate the Caroling Party this year.

Please give generously during the month of October to help us fund our holiday giving. You can write a check to UCF and put 5th Sunday in the memo line. You can either put that check in the collection plate or mail it to David Hughes, Treasurer, UCF, PO Box 425, Morehead City 28557. You can also donate through your Breeze account or on Paypal on the UCF website, https://ucfnc.org/. Again, be sure to select 5th Sunday if you give online.

On October 30th (the 5th Sunday in October) all cash donations in the collection plate that are not marked as a pledge, will also go to the 5th Sunday collection for Holiday Giving.
