Dear Beloveds,

We have begun, at last, to describe ourselves: "UCF is..."

Loving. Compassionate. Pluralistic. Accepting, tolerant, welcoming, and inclusive. Spiritual. Dedicated to Beloved Community. Generous. A beacon. That's just a few of the words we came up with at our Coffee With the Board in March.

And what else? And so what?

What is our purpose? Why does it matter that the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship exists here, in the United States, in Carteret County? What is this building, this fellowship, in service of? What differentiates us from the Lions Club or any other service organization?

In March, I submitted my Interim Appraisal to the Transitions Office at the UUA. (The Board also submitted theirs;

both will be available on the UCF website for anyone to read.) An excerpt from my report:

UCF is in the unique position of being one of the few liberal and/or pluralistic spaces in this county that not only will not shame someone—but will celebrate that person for who they are. This faith community assumes that people have the answers to their own spiritual questions and encourages critical thinking—something many people in

this county have never experienced from a faith community. This LGBTQ-affirming, environmentally conscious faith community is unique in this county, and UCF should not only be proud of that, but screaming it from the rooftops. What is holding us back from being loud and proud about who we are?

This congregation so longs to be seen—to be a visible presence in the community—and yet is strangely reserved about celebrating itself and the many things that make this congregation stand out. At last month's Coffee With the Board, the congregation was reluctant to claim the words "courageous," "leaders," and "radical." Part of knowing yourself is not only knowing who you are—it is about knowing how others see you, and the effect that you have on other people. How many other congregations in Carteret County would have supported a minister who started a gender transition less than a year into their tenure? And then renewed that minister for another year? How many other congregations in Carteret County would have spent years tirelessly working on Family Promise to support same-sex couples? How many other congregations in Carteret County actively support the NAACP and Citizens for Diversity in Education? How many other congregations in Carteret County preach about Daoism, celebrate Samhain, and hold classes on Buddhism? How many other congregations in Carteret County have an EV charger and are set up to be wired for solar panels?

There are, no doubt, people in Carteret County who see the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship as a bunch of freaks and heretics, dangerous to the established order. And there are also countless people in Carteret County for whom this congregation is a beacon of hope, life, and love, a place devoted to—and here I quote a young man who was deeply influenced by UCF— "structural peace, rather than structural violence."

I have no doubt that if there were a thousand more congregations like UCF in the United States, it would be a very different place.

So: what are we doing here?

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
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President's Column

The generosity of this congregation is consistently apparent! As I write this letter in late March for the April newsletter, the pledge goal of \$140,000 for 2023-24 is within reach! Thank you to all who have pledged your money and time!

As President of the Board of Trustees, I want to assure you that your Board has heard that you want to begin a search for a full-time contract minister to begin service to UCF in August, 2024. We are taking the needed steps to make sure that happens. Each member will be asked who should be on the Search Committee. The members of the Search Committee should know the congregation well, be a trusted and responsive member of the congregation, and be willing to devote the needed time to the search. Members' choices will be collected, and those named will be contacted to determine their willingness to serve on the Search Committee. A slate of Search Committee members will be selected by the Board and this slate will be presented for ratification at the Annual Meeting in June and appointed by the Board.

The Board of Trustees has been busy planning for the selection of the Search Committee, working on safety and security plans for the building, and consolidating congregational input from the March Coffee with the Board on UCF Identity.

Please plan to participate in the April 16 Coffee with the Board. The topic will be UCF's Mission and Vision! We will look at our current Mission statement and Vision statement and discuss whether a revision is needed. Our current statements were adopted in 2013 so it's time for a review. The Mission Statement describes UCF's core purpose and whether the current mission statement reflects that core purpose. The Vision Statement should give us a picture of where we want UCF to be in five years, what we want UCF to become. I'm thinking of all that has happened since 2013: purchasing 2900 Bridges Street, remodeling the Rev. Sally B. White Center, tearing down an old sanctuary, building a new sanctuary, saying "Happy Retirement to Rev. Sally!", COVID, the interim ministry with Rev. Ma. I'm sure that you can name more changes at UCF that have happened in the past 10 years. I think just being in this new space allows us to think bigger about UCF because the small space we had at 1300 Evans Street may have limited our dreams. Please review the statements on the website ucfnc.org and come to the Coffee with the Board on April 16 so we can talk about them.



Do you need more FUN in your life? We are putting together some great activities for all ages.



Fifth Sunday Offering

Our fifth Sunday offering in April will be Coastal Carolina Riverwatch and the White Oak Water-keeper, suggested by UCF Green Sanctuary. Coastal Carolina Riverwatch (CCRW) is a water quality advocacy nonprofit, serving the White Oak River basin, and representing thousands of eastern North Carolina citizens committed to protecting our local waterways. Our mission is to protect the quality of water and quality of life in coastal NC. We do this through strong advocacy, and boots-on-the ground research and programming in local communities. What makes us different from other local environmental organizations is our collaboration and research-based advocacy. We collaborate with key stakeholders in the community like UCF's congregation, and we listen to your voices to prioritize our work.

Some of our projects include: Water Quality for Fisheries and our short film Tidal Alert, Emerging Contaminants and PFAS, Microplastics study, Pure Farms Pure Waters, and our community Advocacy Working Group. CCRW is a small, but mighty, two staff organization that works to fill many gaps in service to our local communities. Your financial support provides our Executive Director and White Oak Waterkeeper with resources like water monitoring lab materials and community water quality events, to ensure all creeks, rivers, and sounds are safe for fishing, swimming, and drinking. UCF is 100% Green!

Remember the song, - Bein' Green – sung by Kermit? Well, he was right. It's not easy bein' green. Here at UCF we do our best to stand for doing the right thing. So look around – where is all the 'green'?

When the sanctuary was being designed, the NBT (New Building Team) was asked to make sure that solar panels could be put on our roof. So the NBT had the contractor engineer the roof to support the extra weight of solar panels. Where are the panels? The solar panels – and wind turbines – are so well incorporated into our building, you can't see them. And that is the issue. Most members and certainly most anyone passing by our campus do not realize that UCF is 100% green.

Way back when we lived at 1300 Evans St we were a wind powered church. (This is a perfect place for a pun about talking too much.) When our campus was completed we are once again wind (and now also solar) powered.

Let me explain. We paid Arcadia Power for our electricity. Arcadia took a percentage of our Duke Energy bill to pay for buying renewable energy – wind turbine electric energy. Arcadia then paid Duke. This round about way of paying for electricity is a little more expensive, but we can say in all honesty, that our entire campus is green, renewable electric power. We installed a car charging station - a way to cut down transportation emissions – and that is all renewable electric power. A double punch for our environmental dollar.

The Benavides family – members who gifted UCF with a solar panel when they moved back to Peru – started UCF onusing Community Solar. Unlike Arcadia Power to whom we pay a premium for clean energy, Community Solar pays a credit on each electric bill, depending on how much energy the panels put on the electric grid. Attached is a copy of our Arcadia bill for December 2022.


New Member Biography

Church Building Security

The Building and Grounds Task Force has discussed various ways to ensure the security of our campus. Our goals are to increase deterrents to prevent unwanted visitors, give educated and reasonable access to the buildings to those who need it, and define procedures for accessing and securing the buildings. There are 4 focus areas.

1) Deterrents:

Video cameras and warning signs have been installed at the Church Street entrance of the Sally B White Center and Church Street entrance of the Sanctuary Building. We concluded that lighting from the UCF campus, from our neighbors, and from the city, provide adequate lighting for our campus.

2) Door Management:

Most of our doors can be awkward or difficult to manage without hands on training. We are confident that the reason our doors have been left unlocked is that people do not know how to lock them. We have documented how each door is locked and unlocked, from outside and inside, permanently, and temporarily, and how to make sure a door is locked. We will offer classes to whoever needs that training. This training is critical to anyone needing access to our buildings. Everyone needs to understand that it is not possible to get locked inside our buildings. There is always a push bar or door handle that will open the door. Everyone needs to be trained to never take a key from a key box to inside the buildings.

3) Lockup procedure:

On Sunday, the service helper team will be responsible for ensuring all Sanctuary Building exterior doors are locked unless there are additional meetings taking place. If there are additional meetings taking place, the service helper team will ensure some qualified person will assume that responsibility. The Religious Exploration administrator will ensure that the Sally B. White Center is secure. At other times, the leader or scheduler of additional activities in the Sanctuary Building or Sally B. White Center will execute the lockup procedure. Never assume there is someone else in the building(s) who will lock up. Always assume it is you.

4) Access to buildings:


Non-UCF organizations will not be given direct access to our buildings. There must always be a UCFer to unlock/open/lock the doors. The key box on the Sally B. White Center has been moved higher up on the wall but still accessible by someone in a wheelchair. A new key box has been installed on the Sanctuary Building. It is mounted on the wall and accessible by someone in a wheelchair. This will provide easier access plus prevent additional damage to the door handle. We save the existing hanging key box for use on future projects. Eventually, we will change the existing combination on each of the 2 key boxes. We will use the same combo on each box. Using a single combination will simplify access by UCFers who need access. We will recommend this change take place and notify the congregation after a critical mass has received security training. UCFer's needing direct access to our buildings will be given the combination or a key by the Building and Grounds Committee chair. The chair will send changes to the administration person keeping track of keys.

Some folks like the bamboo alternative, and there are companies that give back by providing sanitary facilities overseas. When you consider that 27,000 trees are cut down every day to make toilet paper, it's well worth considering some alternatives!
