



I may be on vacation, but that doesn't mean I'm not thinking about you! Actually, some of this won't be a vacation at all.

Did you know that some of a minister's "time off" is **study leave?** That's time away from the congregation so that a minister can work on other ministerial projects, such as writing a book or doing research. In my case, I'll be researching a **strategic growth plan** for the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship. This brand new building in a very visible location won't fill up with people all by itself!

It requires a focused strategy to not only bring people in, but integrate them into the life of the congregation. I know because I've heard—and have experienced myself—how welcoming and nonjudgmental this congregation is. Now we need to tell everyone about it!

By the time you read this, General Assembly will be over, and I will have spent much of that conference talking to and learning about strategic growth plans, learning from others what has worked and what hasn't. I'm aware of UCF's specific context, and that what works in one place may not work in another.

Then, while I'm in California, I'll also be researching. I'll be reading books, talking to ministers, and constructing a plan. When I return in August, we'll start this new program year off strong with a **leadership retreat** that will tackle a strategic growth plan tailored to UCF.

Your job, in the meantime, is to rest and renew yourselves—and think about what ministerial functions are important in a congregation that's decided to grow. These ministerial functions will be different from your previous minister. There are only 24 hours in a day, and your minister can only accomplish so much in a week—and if you want to grow, much of your minister's energy will be outward focused. What skills do you want that minister to have? What are you willing to do yourselves, so that your minister can have more time for outreach?

I believe in only working as hard as the congregation does. This congregation works pretty darn hard, so I am too. I'm all in, so let's go all in together.

President's Column

July Coastline From the President

The congregation's Annual Meeting is in the books! Welcome to new Board Members: Co-Secretaries Susan Roberts and Miriam Green, and Treasurer, Joan Burton. Barb Thomas was elected to the Nominating Committee. The Bylaws change was approved, simplifying the formation of Search Committees. The congregation approved adoption of the Eighth Principle. The installation of a flagpole which will fly the American flag, the Progress Flag, and third flags (consistent with UCF values) which will rotate was approved. The Board appointed the Search Committee to begin the process of hiring a full-time contract minister in 2024; the Search Committee is Tom Cullison, Miriam Green, Penny Hooper, Amy Jones, and Sarah Grenier.

As I write this, I'm getting ready to go to Pittsburgh for the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association. Along with a list of what needs to go in my carryon and a plan for the workshops I'll attend, I'm preparing a list for security. On that list are: TSA PreCheck, masks for the plane and the convention center, some rapid COVID tests, getting a COVID booster. It's recommended that we not leave the convention center wearing our name tags, and that we walk with someone to and from the hotel. In the airports, hotel, and convention center, I'll remember to notice the location of exits and fire extinguishers and fire alarm pull stations.

The UCF Board, as the Safety Committee, is planning for safety and security of our buildings. There are policies in place for COVID and for natural disasters. In the works are policies for Fire Safety and Building Security. Scheduled for review is the Communication Policy which includes elements of a policy of Right Relations. While we have some policies for the safety of children and youth, more are needed, and there are additional opportunities for development in the areas of financial safety and social media safety.

A sanctuary is meant to be a place of safety and refuge. However, safety doesn't just happen. It takes planning, communication, and practice. Within the next few weeks, the Board will be ready to conduct a pilot study for locking doors during worship services and meetings. We are ordering some equipment so that we'll know if a latecomer needs entry and for communication between the two buildings, and we plan to have this equipment in place by July 9 so we can test the process and adjust it as needed in July. The result will be the first procedure to be included in the Building Security Plan. Other pieces of this plan will follow, and these will form a comprehensive policy/procedure.

As we move toward making UCF a safer and more secure place for all, members and friends will encounter new procedures that may seem somewhat cumbersome at first. Your Board of Trustees asks everyone to work with us in the spirit of cooperation to keep our campus both safe and accessible.


Get ready for an UnUUsual Obstacle Course!



Rev. David Morris retired in June of 2022 as minister of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of the Outer Banks in Kitty Hawk, NC. He served in UU ministry for 21 years, with congregations in North Carolina, Virginia, and Northern California. He was active in UUA anti-racism efforts from the start of his ministry and served the Association in other volunteer positions at the district and national level.

The Rev. Dr. Gaye Morris lives in Manteo NC with David, great-grandson Oliver, and three goofy hound dogs. She was ordained in 2013 and served until 2019 as the full time minister of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Augusta, GA. She is retiring this month from her role as the affiliated Community Minister of the Oak Ridge Unitarian Universalist Church, Oak Ridge Tennessee. She teaches online courses in Communication as an adjunct instructor with Augusta University, Augusta GA. She is the Secretary/Treasurer for the UU Justice Ministry of North Carolina. Breeze 101 and Tips

What is Breeze? Breeze is the online database software that we use to keep track of our members, friends and visitors, our events calendar, our financial contributions, attendance and so much more. In order for a member of the congregation to access Breeze, you must set up an account with a user name and password. If you haven't done that yet, or aren't sure if you have, please contact Barb Thomas (<u>bsthomas2@gmail.com</u>) or Jo Ellen Essex (<u>jolnsx@yahoo.com</u>) and we will send you a link and instructions to set up your access.

Does Breeze scare you? You are not alone! Many of us are not sure how to use it, so here are some tips from Barb and Jo Ellen.

First, you get to Breeze by using this link: Unitarian Coastal Fellowship | Breeze

Or use this address: https://unitariancoastal.breezechms.com Then you want to save it as a **bookmark** to get back to it easily. If you have already set up your account, your email address is already in Breeze, so if you need to reset your password, you can do that by saying you forgot your password (don't we all?). It will send an email to you which will give you your username and a link to change your password.

To make full use of Breeze, when you are in Breeze on the dashboard click on "My Profile". You can update any missing or incorrect information. If you want other people in our congregation to be able to contact you, make sure you are **opted in to the Directory**. We ESPECIALLY want to have a picture of you for new (and old) members – it helps build our community! We have numerous wonderful photographers (Karen Baggott, Susan Roberts, etc.) who will help you with this if you need it. Or you can just send us a photo of yourself, and we will add it to your profile.

Another very useful location while looking at your page is GIVING (on the left-hand side). When you go into this tab you can see what your donations are, as well as what you pledged for the year. The pledge tab is in the middle of the page. This is a great reminder to change your bank's automatic monthly pledge in July, when our new fiscal year begins. No one else can see your Giving page except the Treasurer/Asst. Treasurer/Bookkeeper. This is kept confidential.

If you are the head of a Committee or Task Force, we can give you Standard status, so that you can send group emails, as well as enter events on the Breeze calendar. Make sure you add your event to the "Open to All" or "Private" calendar so it will appear to everyone.

Feel free to click around in Breeze and get familiar with what it has to offer. You can't hurt anything! Breeze is a great tool for UCF and we should make good use of it. Let us know if you have additional questions.

Remember, there are NO DUMB QUESTIONS!

UCF's Next Blood Drive Tuesday, July 25 from 10 am to 3 pm



UCF Pride 2023 Update

UCF Pride 2023

The Welcoming Congregation Team is excited and appreciative of the congregational support to install a nautical flag pole and fly the American flag, Progress flag and a rotating third flag that represents our UU values.

Fifty-one members voted and 43 responses were either strongly agree, agree or undecided for 84% of the vote. With undecided responses removed, at total of



42 members voted with 34 of these being strongly agree or agree for 81% of the vote. We will work with the town of Morehead for approval of the placement of the flagpole and will proceed in conjunction with our safety plan.

Community Activities

UCF was also involved in many activities during the month of June to acknowledge Pride month. These activities celebrated the LGBTQ+ community and highlighted the issues and discrimination the LGBTQ+ community still faces today.

UCF participated in Crystal Coast Proud's 3rd annual Pride in the Park and handed out information about our church, UU principles and fun giveaways like temporary tattoos, bubbles, stickers, rainbow candy and small Progress flags.

SHARE THE PLATE FOR JULY: STUFF THE BUS

This year we will be trying out a different way of collecting for local organizations. Instead of 5th Sundays, starting in July, we will be instituting "Share the Plate", a program that many other UU churches use successfully. The Social Justice Committee will select a different organization for each month, and during that month, any money in the collection plate that is not designated for pledges, will be equally divided between UCF and the selected organization. Anyone can submit suggestions for local organizations for future months by contacting Harriet Altman or Barb Thomas. You can find out what organization is receiving the Share the Plate collection each month by checking the Wave or the Coastline.

For the month of July, we will be splitting the plate with "Stuff the Bus", a program of the Carteret County Public Schools Foundation. They will be collecting money, school supplies and book bags during the month of July, loading all the supplies into the book bags and putting them all on a school bus. On August 7 th, Carteret County students and their families who are in need can come to Parkview Baptist Church in Morehead City to pick up a backpack. There will also be distributions in other parts of the county on August 11 th. July has five Sundays, with the last one on July 30 th and we will plan to get the money to the CCPS Foundation as soon as possible so they can use it to buy any school supplies that they still need.

UCF Members Facilitate the Relocation of Zherdetska Sisters from Ukraine

On Sunday, June 4th, we were happy to see Pat Curley and Kateryna Zherdetska cóme through our doors. Kateryna (Kate) had arrived the previous Friday in Jacksonville to meet Pat and his wife, Nancy, who are sponsoring Kate and her sister, Daria, who are seeking humanitarian asylum in the US since leaving Ukraine. After much difficulty in their travels, they ended up in Ireland. Daria has had to return to her parents' home in Ukraine to be able to get an adult



passport, but the sisters decided that Kate should come ahead and get situated here. Hopefully, Daria will be joining her very soon.

Kate, Daria and the Curleys met through a website called Welcome.US in a partnership with Rotary International. Pat and Nancy have made a commitment to support the young women for up to two years. Green Tip

Beach season is officially here! We're all eager to enjoy the sun and sand after the winter, but it pays to make yourself and your family into ecoconscious beachgoers, if for no other reason than to preserve the beach ecosystem for future generations to enjoy. Here are some ideas for ways to change your beachgoing MO: replace single use plastic food and beverage containers with reusable ones; replace plastic beach toys with metal; refrain from flying balloons near the beach; leave only footprints, including packing out all trash and knocking down that sand castle; stay off

the dunes and away from sensitive vegetation; don't discard compostables (e.g. orange peels) to keep the beach and water clean; respect the sea creatures you may find; and leave shells and sea glass where you find them – they are also part of the ecosystem.
