Dear Beloveds,

The 2023-2024 program year is beginning! I know UCF has been busy over the summer already, figuring out security processes and procedures to keep everyone safe even as we shine our beacon more brightly than ever before on the Crystal Coast. The Search Committee has been hard at work gathering materials and getting ready to survey the congregation, and the Board and leadership will be readying and implementing the strategic growth plan that we will put together at this month's Leadership Retreat.

One presentation from the Unitarian Universalist Ministers' Association that I attended, about trends in congregational ministry, presented one graph that was surprising to me: that many congregations say they are interested in growth, and yet when asked whether or not they are engaged in the surrounding community, it turns out that they're not "walking their talk." This is certainly not my experience with the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship, which donates regularly to local nonprofits and participates in community activities such as Project Christmas Cheer and GospelFest.

As we gather ourselves to focus on growth, let us think about other ways we can show up in the community. What about staffing a water station during local races and triathlons? Marching in the Veterans Day parade? Are there more local festivals, such as Family Pride in the Park, that we can participate in?

What are some taglines we can use to describe the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship? Maybe something like "UCF: Where There's More Than One Right Answer to Every Question" or "UCF: Building an Intentionally Diverse Beloved Community" or even "UCF: We Reduce, Reuse, Recycle."

And then once we are successfully bringing in a regular stream of visitors, some of which decide to stick around, how do we intentionally integrate them into the community? How do they learn how to get involved and how to become a member? How do we learn who they are and their gifts, so that we can invite them to contribute in ways that make them come alive and grow spiritually?

These are some of the questions we'll be tackling at the upcoming Leadership Retreat. We won't answer all of those questions this year—and indeed, they have more than one right answer!—but we will craft a roadmap for tackling these issues. This roadmap will also tell us more about what we're looking for in our next minister, and how that minister sees themselves in relationship to this map. Are they the navigator or the driver? Are they the steering wheel or the gas pedal or the brake? Or...?

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August Coastline From the President

The Back to School advertisements are here! It's time for families to buy back packs, pencils, crayons, and new clothes. While UCF meets year-round, it's also the beginning of a new church year, and I'm making plans just like I used to make plans for the school year when I was a student.

I was inspired at General Assembly in Pittsburgh by being with thousands of Unitarian Universalists. Jo Ellen Essex, Rev. Ma, and I went to Pittsburgh while Holly Rogers attended virtually. The worship services and workshops were meaningful, and there is a lot of information to share with you. The new President of the UUA is Rev. Dr. Sophia Betancourt. She spoke to General Assembly about the need for communal care, serving one another, organizing for justice, and widening the circle of concern. I'm looking forward to the next six years of her leadership of the UUA.

Amendments to Article II, the Purposes and Covenant, of the UUA Bylaws were approved by the General Assembly delegates and the amended Article II was approved preliminarily. It will be presented for final approval at the 2024 General Assembly. I'm looking forward to learning more about the proposed amended Article II during the next year.

At UCF, a retreat has been planned on August 19 for the new UCF Board of Trustees, Leadership Council and Search Committee. Goals for the retreat include team building, reviewing covenants, and setting goals.

The door locking trial has been completed for three weeks during worship services as I write this. There have been some kinks to work out in the process, but I'm confident that we will be able to find a process that works. Thank you for your cooperation and participation in the silent doorbell demonstration on July 23; it will take some practice to get used to the new system to allow safe entry to those who want to worship.



SHARE THE PLATE FOR AUGUST: CARTERET LONG TERM RECOVERY ALLIANCE



This year we are trying a different way of collecting for local organizations. Instead

of 5th Sundays, in July, we started "Share the Plate." The Social Justice Committee selects a different organization each month, and during that month, any money in the collection plate that is not designated for pledges, is equally divided between UCF and the selected organization. Anyone can submit suggestions for local organizations for future months by contacting Harriet Altman or Barb Thomas. You can find out what organization is receiving the Share the Plate collection each month by checking the Wave or the Coastline.

For the month of August, we are sharing the plate with **Carteret Long Term Recovery Alliance,** a nonprofit, totally volunteer led organization that helps people who sustain damages due to natural disasters. CLTRA formed in 2018 after Hurricane Florence and almost five years later, close to 400 families have been helped yet over 150 are still in need of assistance. CLTRA is committed to remain an active presence in our community until the last home is completed and will be here to serve should another disaster impact our community. MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE

At the July 9 Worship Service, Tom Cullison, Miriam Green, Penny Hooper,



Amy Jones and Sarah Grenier accepted the charge to serve on the Ministerial Search Committee for UCF's next fulltime contract minister. The committee members' response to the congregation was "We hear your charge and set it upon our hearts. We covenant to listen well, bear in mind the congregation's vision and mission, and always remember that we are seeking to fulfill the needs of the larger congregation. Thank you for your trust."

The Search Committee's Congregational Covenant is:

As a Search Committee representing our congregation, we covenant with our congregation to:

A. Serve our congregation to the best of our ability, realizing, both as a group and individually, we represent the face of our congregation and community in the ministerial search process. We will represent our congregation with forthright honesty, care, compassion, and respect.

B. Follow the rules and timelines within the Transitional Ministry Handbook.

C. Honor a minister's needs to follow the Guidelines for the UUMA.

D. Listen to, inform and work with our congregation, the Transitions Office, Regional Staff, and Regional Transitions Coaches throughout the transitional process.

E. Understand the need for fairness and confidentiality throughout the search process.

(MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE CONT.)

One of the Search Committee's highest priorities is two-way communication with the congregation. We want to hear your ideas, comments, and suggestions. In addition to receiving feedback through individual conversations with members and friends, the Search Committee is developing a congregational survey that you will receive August 18 and we are planning "Cottage Meetings" during September-October.

The congregational survey will help UCF and our future minister understand our congregation better and will help guide us through - out the application and interview process to select our next fulltime contract minister. You will receive a link to this survey in the August 18 Wave and the survey will conclude on August 31.

The timing of the survey will allow us to analyze your feedback and will help guide the "Cottage Meetings" that we plan to hold in September and October. "Cottage Meetings" are similar to focus groups and will help us gain an even deeper understanding of the needs of the larger congregation. The information and feedback we receive from the survey and the "Cottage Meetings" will help enrich the UCF congregational profile that we will share with ministerial applicants. When the UCF congregational profile is complete, we will also post this on our website.

Last and not least, please make plans to stay after the worship service on August 27th to hear more about the Search Committee and to provide your feedback and ideas.

Tips From The Team

PCT HOT TIPS

As we approach the hottest month of the year here are some tips for staying cool and avoiding heat related illnesses.

- Stay hydrated— Drink more fluids, regardless of how active you are.
- Pace yourself especially if you are outdoors in the heat.
- Wear sunscreen.
- Avoid alcohol— This increases your body fluid loss.
- Stay away from hot and heavy meals.

Always check the elderly, infants and pets who are more susceptible to the heat, especially in non-airconditioned areas and closed cars.

GREEN TIP

Going electric is not just for automobiles. You may wish to consider an electric propulsion system for your boat as a positive contribution to a greener environment. The advantages of electric motors for boats

are like those for automobiles. These include zero emissions from the motor and the ability to use clean energy, especially solar, for recharging batteries. Because petroleum-based fuels and lubricants are not needed, the risk of spills of these contaminants in aquatic ecosystems is eliminated. Electric motors require less routine maintenance than their petroleumpowered counterparts. Electric boat motors do share some limitations shared with their automotive cousins, and these should be evaluated when considering repowering. The power and range of electric-powered boats are limited by battery size. Batteries and other equipment can be expensive, and there are environmental costs associated with manufacture and disposal of batteries. However, electric propulsion options for boats are entering the mainstream, and electric power may be an attractive option for smaller boats and those used infrequently.
