Then there was a year where we were, at last, in our new building! And that year we spent relearning who we are, while also learning how to use our new kitchen, lock our new doors, and operate our new sound system. We had to fundraise so that we could continue with full-time ministry.

And now, at last, we're looking at the last year of this interim period. We've had some successes: a fantastic start to our Social Justice Film Series, and a new Children & Family Ministries Committee to oversee the rejuvenation of our children's program. The Board is working hard on a long-term strategic growth plan as well as developing policies and procedures around safety and security. We're installing a flagpole and will soon—this month—be flying flags that demonstrate our values. We are growing into being the beacon of inclusivity, justice, equity, and love that the Crystal Coast so desperately needs.

And there are and will be bumps on the road ahead. We still need to grow our financial capacity in order to ensure the sustainability of full-time ministry, especially as there continues to be a "minister shortage." We still need leaders to serve on the Board, the Membership Committee, the Worship Committee, the Committee on Ministry, and the new Children & Family Ministries Committee. And we know that many of our current leaders are very, very tired.

To those current leaders: We see you. We acknowledge you. And if you need to take a break, if you are questioning your commitments, if you would like to actually enjoy your retirement, do so. Life is too short to dedicate yourself to things that aren't enriching your life.

And to those who have newly joined or who are considering joining: Let us know your gifts and talents. Tell us what you are passionate about. Together, we can make something beautiful. We can create a faith community that enriches your life and the life of those around you. No, we *will* create that faith community. That's what we're here for.

# President's Column

## October Coastline From the President

I am so excited about UCF's Search for a full-time contract minister! Our Search Committee has been meeting weekly since the end of June and has accomplished a large amount of work. At the September 24 Coffee with the Board and the Search Committee, Miriam Green reported on the committee's schedule and we heard from Sarah Grenier about the results of the Congregational Survey. Penny Hooper reported on the Cottage Meetings and how the Search Committee will use the information. In the Congregational Profile report, Tom Cullison described the Congregation Profile; the ministers in search will read the UCF profile and decide if they want to apply for our position. Information from the survey and from the cottage meetings will be included in the profile, in interview questions, and help the Search Committee find the best person for our job. Amy Jones reported the many ways the Search Committee communicates with the congregation; look for information in the Wave, the Coastline, and in Sunday morning announcements.

I share the optimism of the Search Committee that UCF will be able to attract applicants and that our new minister will be hired to start in August, 2024, at the end of Rev. Ma's interim. The Board is working on a proposed ministerial contract and has been given a draft of the unfinished Profile. The Profile will be available for the congregation to see when it is completed. I'm looking forward to the next Coffee with the Board and the Search Committee on October 29!

# President's Column

The Board of Trustees is the Safety Committee of UCF. There are a few remaining details to iron out, but the locking doors during worship services has been successful and will continue. Next, will be discussions of locking doors for other meetings and continued training on building and congregation safety.

October is Fire Prevention Month. The Board is planning a Fire Drill sometime this month. If there is a fire during a service, would you know what to do? As you attend services and meetings this month, please notice the location of our lighted exits in both buildings. If there is a fire, please assist others to exits and go across Church Street to the Salvation Army parking lot. If your children are in activities in the Rev. Sally B. White Building, please meet them in the Salvation Army parking lot; their teachers and the staff will be responsible for evacuating them to the parking lot. There are maps in each meeting room in the Rev. Sally B. White Center showing the way to the nearest exits and the locations of fire extinguishers. Notice the fire alarm pulls in the Rev. Sally B. White building. Look for the fire extinguishers. Do you want to be trained to use the fire extinguishers? All staff and those who volunteer with children will be trained.

Your UCF Board and Search Committee value your input on the Ministerial Search, on church safety, and want to hear from you on these and other topics. Let us know your thoughts in person, by phone, or by email on these and other topics whether you've been a member for years or have visited only a few times.

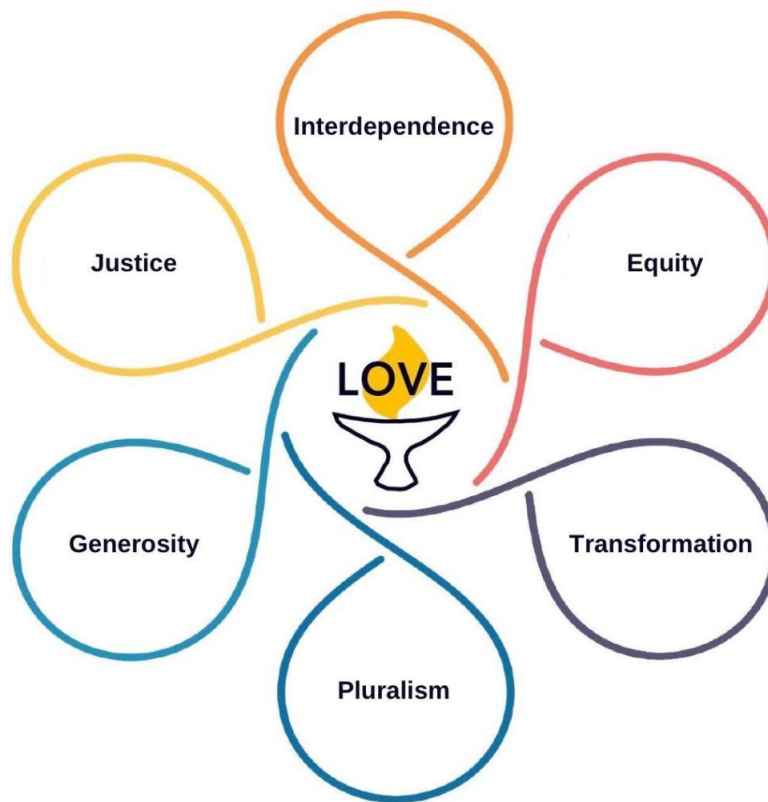
## Oct. 29: Celebrating Samhain

# UUA Update

## Have You Seen This Before?



You might have seen it at General Assembly or in an email or newsletter from the Unitarian Universalist Association.

For the past two years, the UUA has been engaged in studying a possible revision to Article II of the UUA by-laws. These by-laws contain the purpose of the UUA as well as the Seven Principles. The Study Commission has proposed a draft of the new Article II, which eliminates the current Seven Principles and replaces them instead with Seven Values, with Love at the Center. You can read the draft of the proposed new Article II [in their report](#).

This draft was voted on at General Assembly in June, and there will be one more year of study and amendments. It will be voted on again at General Assembly in 2024, and at that point it will become part of the by-laws or not.

You'll be hearing more about Article II and these values in the coming year!

## **Mental Health Family Support Group Mondays 3:30pm-5:00pm**

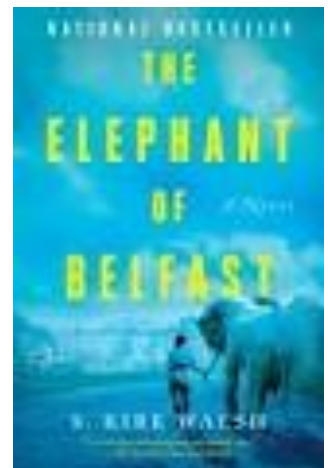

## Share the Plate for September and October

### *Holiday Gift Giving*

Our Share the Plate collections in September and October will be for our Holiday Giving projects. For many years now, Unitarian Coastal Fellowship has given generously at holiday time to those in our community who are often left out at this season. Any money in the collection plate that is not designated for pledges will be equally divided between UCF and Holiday Gift Giving. There are three holiday traditions that we have established:

We put together Holiday Gift Bags containing gift cards (\$20 or \$25) and items hand-made by the Twisted Sisters needlecraft group and give them to those at Hope Mission's Homeless Shelter and Recovery Homes and to clients of Beach House, a program for adults with severe and persistent mental illness. Last year we also put toothpaste and toothbrushes in the bags.

We also adopt children from the Angel Tree through Project Christmas Cheer. These are children whose parents can't afford to give them much for the holidays. Those selected are vetted by Carteret County Social Services. Our children and youth shop for these Angel children, wrap the presents and have a pizza party.

And, we bring gift bags with handmade hats, scarves, etc. to the clients of Empower (formerly Station Club) – our neighbors on Church Street. Empower is a program that provides vocational training for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Now that Covid is not as much of a threat, we have resumed holding an annual Caroling Party for Empower.

Please give generously during the months of September and October to help us fund our holiday giving. You can write a check to UCF and put Share the Plate in the memo line. You can either put that check in the collection plate or mail it to Joan Burton, Treasurer, UCF, PO Box 425, Morehead City 28557. You can also donate through your Breeze account or on Paypal on the UCF website: <https://ucfnc.org/>. Again, be sure to select Share the Plate if you give online. Each Sunday in September and October all cash donations in the collection plate that are not marked as a pledge, will also go to the Share the Plate collection for Holiday Giving.

## UCF ONLINE DIRECTORY THROUGH BREEZE

**On November 1, all official Members of UCF will be “opted in” to the Online Directory in Breeze, unless they have “opted out” in Breeze or notify us that they wish to be opted out.** The Online Directory is one of the many benefits of our subscription to the Breeze software.

- It allows you to see other members’ contact information (email, phone, address) in case you need to contact them or send them something in the mail
- It does NOT allow anyone to see your monetary contributions. Only our Treasurer and Finance Chair can access that information. You can access your own contributions on your profile page but not anyone else’s.
- Anyone may “Opt-Out” of the Directory which makes your profile unavailable to members of the congregation, except those in leadership positions who can access all profiles

Breeze is an online “Church Management System” which is a database which allows our leaders and congregation to:

- Keep our own contact information up to date
- Manage and track your donations and pledge
- Organize group and committee communications
- Keep an up to date church calendar which is shared on our website
- Make registration forms for church events

Right now, we have 43 people in our congregation who have opted-in to our online directory. The Membership Committee has decided that to make the Directory more useful, we will add all official members to the Online Directory, unless they opt out. We hope all “friends” will also opt in to the Directory. **PLEASE KEEP IN MIND THAT ONLY MEMBERS OF OUR CONGREGATION CAN ACCESS THE UCF BREEZE ACCOUNT AND SEE THE DIRECTORY.**

So, what does that mean for you?

- If you already have set up your Breeze access and have Opted In or Out of the Directory, you don’t need to do anything.
- If you have already set up your access to Breeze by creating a user-name and password, you can log in, go to your profile page and check to see that your contact info is correct. On the lower left side of the profile page, you will see the gray bar that says “online directory”. Click on the “Click to edit” prompt and choose “yes” to opt into the directory and “no” to opt out. Both members and friends can do this.

- If you are an official "Member" of UCF and don't want to be listed in the online Directory, email Barb Thomas and let her know. We will Opt you out of the directory.
- If you have not yet set up your access to Breeze, email Barb Thomas and she will send you an invitation to set up your access along with instructions on how to do it. Once you have access to Breeze you can go to your profile and decide whether to Opt-in or out of the Directory.

**Finally, if you are an official Member, you will receive an email a week or so before November 1<sup>st</sup>, reminding you that you will be Opted-In to the Directory if you have not already set your preference.**

*\*We also hope to have a picture on every profile so those looking at the Directory can put a face to the name. Look for more information about this in the Wave.*

# Tips From The Team

## PCT HOT TIPS

### Triple Vax coming this Fall

Many older adults will be encouraged to get three vaccines as the weather turns colder this year. The Covid-19 booster (to be updated this fall) and the flu vaccines can be taken together.

The third and newest of the vaccines is for RSV, respiratory syncytial virus, which probably causes as much illness as the flu according to the National Foundation for

Infectious Diseases. RSV hit the US especially hard last year and the FDA approved two versions of the RSV vaccine in May. Unlike the Covid booster and flu vaccines, RSV vaccine should be taken separately.

## GREEN TIP

Have you heard about citizen science? There are a number of organizations that sponsor ways for ordinary citizens to gather crucial data that help biologists understand our natural world better.
