Children and Family Ministries

December was a blast! We had a super chaotic and super fun Solstice Pageant, a yummy cookie exchange (big ups to Janet and Drew for bringing cookies to decorate!), a pizza-filled Project Christmas Cheer day, and a sweet and helpful First Sunday Funday where a dozen of us helped assemble gift bags for the staff and residents of Beach House. In fact, we were so busy having fun that we might have forgotten to take pictures...?!

Starting in January, there will be some changes in our children's programming. Don't panic! We're going to be introducing **more structure**. Starting in January, we are going to practice having the students enter the classroom **calmly**, light a chalice, and read a story together before having free play.

Then, in March or April we will introduce a new curriculum called **Spirit Play**, which is a Montessori-style curriculum used by Unitarian Universalist churches all over the country. Each class begins with storytelling (the students choose the story!), with time for creative expression afterward. As we get closer, we will be asking the congregation for help getting the classroom ready for Spirit Play.

And now: January events!

- Jan 7: **First Sunday Funday!** Everyone is invited to help us with a no sew blanket tying project! Once tied, these will become rugs that the children will sit and lie on for Spirit Play. We will have all kinds of patterns: unicorns, dinosaurs, dogs, butterflies...
- Jan 21: **Yo, Who Put Dragons in the Church?!** January's multigenerational service is Dungeons & Dragons themed! (Don't worry, we'll make sure it's not too scary, in case your little one has nightmares.) We're going to work together to use our shared values of interdependence, generosity, and justice to battle a villain of bigotry, greed, and inequity. All are welcome to bring a D&D character, if they have one!
- Jan. 28: **If I Had a Hammer** Activist and musician, Pete Seeger, will be celebrated in this service. Barb Thomas and Karen Baggott will bring back words and songs from a look at his life that was presented at UCF in 2015, one year after his passing. Through his music, he inspired many to do more for the environment and for social justice. School-aged children will be staying for this service, while children 4 and below will be sung out to the Nursery as usual.



If you have a hammer, come sing along!





SHARE THE PLATE FOR JANUARY NAACP Scholarship Fund

For the month of January, our Share the Plate collection will go to the NAACP Scholarship fund. The fund will receive half of all offerings collected that are not designated as a pledge payment. The other half goes to UCF.

The NAACP of Carteret County has been giving three to four \$500 scholarships for many years to deserving Carteret County graduating senior students. UCF has been supporting this scholarship fund by participating in the NAACP Gospel Festival, which is a fundraiser for the fund. This year, because the Gospel Festival was virtual, UCF was unable to donate as we have in the past. Since the application process begins in January, we have decided to raise money this month to make up the difference.

The NAACP will send applications to the three CC public high schools in January. They will also be sent out to churches and shared with other organizations that work with senior students.

The six member Scholarship Committee uses a selection process that considers need, but academic excellence, leadership, and public service are very important considerations in the process. The Committee's purpose is: higher education for all students. We hope that when we lift up a few students, we lift up many people—their families and friends, and their communities.

Please give as you can during the month of January to help deserving students in our county achieve their academic goals through the NAACP scholarships.

Finally, we gave everyone at Empower a gift bag from UCF, with a knitted or crocheted item from Twisted Sisters, toiletry items and a holiday card. We all agree that this is a joyful event for everyone involved and hope we can continue this tradition into the future.

Holiday Gift Bags

A big thank you to everyone who helped us with our Holiday Gift Bag project this year. We couldn't have done it without your generosity and our many helpers. Bag filling began early this year as we teamed up with the Twisted Sisters knitting, crocheting and sewing group to fill over 50 bags for the Hope Mission Recovery Homes. The Twisted Sisters provided beautiful stockings, stocking stuffers galore and knit scarf and hat sets. UCF donated \$25 Walmart gift cards and greeting cards and bag stuffing power.

On December 3 before the worship service our children and families filled bags (many of which were knit or crocheted by the Twisted Sisters) for Beach House which provides services for adults with severe and persistent mental illness. Each bag contained a hand-made item from the Twisted Sisters, a \$25 Walmart gift card and oral hygiene items or socks.

And finally, after the December 3 service, with lots of help from everyone, we filled over 40 bags for the clients and staff of Empower, the organization close to UCF on Church Street providing services for adults with developmental disabilities. These bags were delivered and passed out at the Christmas Caroling party we held at Empower on December 12. Everyone there was so appreciative. We were also able to provide some Walmart gift cards and hand-made items to the Carteret Long Term Recovery Alliance which helps families recover from disasters.

With everyone helping, we have made the holidays a better time for over 110 individuals and families.
